**Course title**: Special Language Course: *Text Linguistics*

**Course objective**: The linguistic study of units larger than the sentence will enhance the students' capacity to identify and describe discourse structures in general and the structures of samples illustrating particular text types and, consequently, improve their ability to organize a text-based class (as prospective teachers) and to elaborate a text belonging to a well-defined genre respecting specific rules and constraints (within the frame of various professional and social activities).

Course contents: Text, co-text, context. Sentence grammar and text grammar. Communication channels. Textual orientation – expressive, informative and vocative texts. A tentative text typology. Descriptive, narrative, expository, argumentative and directive text types. Fictional vs. non-fictional, impressionistic vs. technical. Illustrative samples. Point of view. Direct and indirect speech. Time and tense (flashback, flashforward). Aspect. Voice. Modality. Composition. Text structure (Cause-effect, spatial temporal, deductive, inductive, text generation and hierarchical units (sentence, paragraph), introduction types and endings types (circular, conclusive, directive, citation etc.). Dialect and idiolect, text specific idiom. Intertextuality. Hypertext. text types and the history of English. News stories, recipes, advertisements, dictionary entries, jokes.
