The Anglo-French Wars in North America (part 1 and 2). The Deportation of the Acadians, The Conquest (La Conquête);

The Royal Proclamation of 1763. The Quebec Act of 1774:

The American War of Independence and its direct consequences on Canada. The Invasion of Canada, The Loyalists, The Constitutional Act of 1791, Upper and Lower Canada;

The War of 1812: The United States vs. Canada. The Rebellions of 1837: the failure of the "American model" in Canada. The Act of Union (1840) and the road towards "responsible government";

The building of a nation and the destruction of another. The Canadian confederation of 1867 and the American War of Secession:

"Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness" vs. "Peace, Order and Good Government". The American Dream vs. the Canadian national obsession. Canada and the United States at the end of the 19th century: different approaches, similar goals;
