







- an alluring 600+ year, 350,000-inhabitant city in Northeastern Romania
- a vibrant IT hub and ranking 6<sup>th</sup> in the top 10 cities with the fastest Internet speed in the world
- a cultural capital of Romania; its National Theatre made it in the top 7 most breathtaking theatres of the World, according to the BBC
- home to one of the 25 most beautiful libraries in the world (part of the University Palace), according to Boredpanda
- a felicitous destination for literature lovers: you will walk on the footsteps of the most famous Romanian writers and poets, whether in the streets, parks or museums
- a major educational pole at the EU border, with some 50,000+ students, 3,500 professors, 50,000 pupils and 3,700 teachers
- the birthplace of the first University of Romania: Alexandru Ioan Cuza University of lasi was established here in 1860 and is now home to over 23,000 students
- an architectural gem of great historical significance its rich past gave its inhabitants a deep sense of belonging and of treasuring values

# JASSY Summer School at UAIC -Building on Tradition, Nurturing Innovation

As of 2018, UAIC broadly expands its existing summer educational offer.

#### Tradition.

With its 46-year old tradition, the Summer School Romania - Language and Civilization organized annually at Alexandru Ioan Cuza University of lasi is undoubtedly one of its true staples. Aside from socializing within an engaging international academic community, over time, hundreds of students from a culturally eclectic pool of countries have had the opportunity to attend interactive courses on the Romanian language, but also on the country's culture and society. Just to name a few activities of these summer courses, one can join workshops on traditional Romanian dancing (and actually learn how to dance!) and pottery-making, or visit the famous monasteries from the cultural area around lasi. Some of the attendees hold scholarships offered by the Romanian Government, while others cover their own participation costs. UAIC also offers a number of scholarships to students coming from universities from the Coimbra Group and Utrecht Network, as well as from other partner institutions. The 47th edition of the Summer School Romania - Language and Civilization will be held between 5 and 22 July, 2018. Widening its summer educational scope through JASSY Summer School (a Journey through hArd sciences, economicS, Social sciences and the tourism industrY), our university offers 5 different modules. More specifically, UAIC is now also opening its doors to participants interested in learning and acquiring (ECTS) credits in Hard Sciences, in Social Sciences and the Humanities, in Finance and Risk Management, in Strategic Human Resource Management or in Tourism (the latter, to be pursued both as an academic and leisure preoccupation). JASSY, with its diverse courses and activities, is targeted toward participants who desire to gain valuable knowledge on a specific topic from those enumerated above or even to pick up a new skill, such as kayaking, tour guiding or sky map reading. All students who attend JASSY Summer School will receive a personalized certificate of attendance. The JASSY certificate of attendance will specify the name of the student, the title of the module and the corresponding number of ECTS credits.

#### JASSY Application Procedure

#### What do you have to do to become a JASSY student?

Just follow the Application and Registration steps below. Between them, we shall do the Evaluation step.

#### 1. Application

The application file consists of a CV and a letter of motivation and will be sent as a Word or PDF file to jassy@uaic.ro. In order to increase your chances to secure a place in JASSY Summer School, you are encouraged to send the application file at your earliest convenience, but anyway no later than 1 June 2018.

#### 2. Evaluation

Your application will be evaluated within 3 days and you will receive an email notification whether the application to JASSY has been accepted. In case of acceptance, the email message will contain the invitation to register (see below). So, you will know whether your application has been successful within as little as three days.

The evaluation will be based on the consistency and pertinence of the application files, as well as the number of available places (30 per module).

#### 3. Registration and fee payment

As a successful candidate, you are invited to a). *fill in a registration form* and b). *pay the corresponding amount* (participation fee and optional costs):

- a). You will receive an acceptance confirmation email which will contain a registration form. Please fill it in and send it back to jassy@uaic.ro at your earliest convenience. Please do not forget to specify your module of choice.
- b). For details on making the payment, please refer to the next section (JASSY financial arrangements).

We strongly encourage you to do the registration and payment within one week from the day you receive the email confirming your acceptance.

Participants who register by 25 April (early-bird registration deadline) will pay the participation fee at the discount rate of 350 euros.

Participants who register between April 26 and 8 June (registration deadline) will pay the regular participation fee of 450 euros.

#### Refund policy

If you have to cancel your participation, refunding will be done based on the date of your cancellation:

- until 11 June, the participation fee is fully refundable (minus the bank charges).
- until 25 June, 50% of the participation fee (minus the bank charges) will be refunded.
- after 25 June, the participation fee is non-refundable.

#### Board and lodging (optional)

UAIC will book accommodation and arrange meals for the participants in JASSY who opt in their registration form to stay in the university campus. The accommodation cost is 150 euro for 2 weeks. The cost for on-campus meals is at most 10 euro per day.

## Weekend trips (optional)

In the registration form, you can also opt for one or both of the following field trips:

- Field trip in the cultural area surrounding lasi: Ceahlău sacred mountain, Medieval Fortress Neamţ, Agapia monastery and the monasteries from Bucovina (UNESCO heritage sites), Folk Art and Customs, Traditional Romanian cuisine and wine (14 - 15 July 2018)
- Trip to Republic of Moldova Tour of Chişinău (the Capital of the Republic of Moldova),
   Cricova winery, Orheiu Vechi natural site (21 22 July 2018)

Each weekend trip costs 100 euros/person and includes transportation, accommodation in twin rooms, 2 lunches, 1 dinner, 1 breakfast, tour guiding. Visiting the Cricova winery entails an additional entry fee of 25 euros, to be paid on site.

# Tourism at the Eastern Border of the EU. Interdisciplinary Training for Tour Guides

The ultimate survival kit to guide you through the jungle of Tourism's best-kept secrets

#### Overview:

If this is the module which piques your interest, then surely you already have an inkling that tour guiding is so much more than a run-of-the-mill profession. Aside from being experts in Tourism, tour guides are time and again required to be true entertainers who can successfully explain and interpret surroundings, people and customs which are oftentimes strikingly different to what their group is accustomed to. For this very reason, they need to forge an all-round pleasant personality. Through this interdisciplinary approach, not only will you learn the theoretical fundamentals of tour guiding, but also how to deliver persuasive speeches, how to master effective information recollection techniques, how to improvise and instill enthusiasm, how to mingle with the locals etc. During the first week, you will learn the essentials of Tourism, whereas during the second, you will have the opportunity to choose between Social Sciences and Hard Sciences, thus tackling topics which best suit your background and interests.
